It is important to remember at Christmas that many people are alone, have no homes or, simply cannot afford the luxury of Christmas. It also reminds the pupils that Christmas is about love for God and others, not just about what we can 'get out of it' for ourselves. Many beautifully wrapped boxes appeared in Room 9 stuffed with tins, cakes, chocolate, tea, coffee, crisps, mince pies, sweets, Christmas puddings and plenty of other Christmas goodies. The 'Making A Difference' Group helped sort the hampers and prepare them for collection. 9S transported the hampers down to the foyer to be collected as well as helping load them into the car ready for delivery. A total of 68 bumper hampers were created; a fantastic achievement. Thanks to all the pupils involved, for their generosity and support for families in our community.



School Transport

It is disappointing that Bury Council have voted to remove discretionary bus passes from pupils travelling to their nearest faith school. I was there, at the Town Hall to support the status quo with other Catholic headteachers and parents, but to no avail. What is important now is what we do about it.

School buses will continue to operate as they do now from outside St Gabriel's School in the future. This will not change. There are only changes to the discretionary bus passes for some pupils.

However, the governing body will be holding a number of meetings to determine how best they can support parents with children currently with us and our future parents with children in primary schools. Immediately after Easter, governors will meet and then I will communicate the outcome of their deliberations to you.

It was really heartening to read the messages of support and the comments on the public consultation. 80% of people who took part in the consultation wanted the council to retain the passes. However, this wasn't the case. Perhaps the consultation, realistically, was not going to make a difference, regardless of the outcome?

St Gabriel's French Spelling Bee

For the third year running, we have put Year 7 through their paces as they faced the huge challenge that is the National Spelling Bee Competition. 50 French words had to be learnt then spelt out correctly using the French alphabet including accented letters. At 2.55pm, everyone in school was given the opportunity to stop whatever they were doing and spend fifteen minutes reading a book, magazine or newspaper. There was a lovely sense of relaxation in each and every classroom which was visited.

Each school sent a team of pupils along with their display board and interactive items that summarised their entry. All the pupils had a chance to demonstrate their excellent science knowledge to St Marie's pupils and the three judges – two pupils from Year 9 – Natalia Abramowicz and Beatrice Lee Horton and Steve Rossington from Salford University.

The teams also had an explosive show demonstrated by Steve Rossington - or as one of the pupils from St Joseph and St Bede's said "are we going to see a show on real science!"

This year we had displays on friction, characteristics of materials, fizzing fun, what floats your boat, separating solids and liquids, and a robot style sorting machine. Hollymount had an interesting team made up of Year 6 and Year 1.

The judges and all of the Year 9 ambassadors were thoroughly impressed with the scientific process demonstrated by all the teams and each team was awarded a prize to match their particular skills. These ranged from scientific thought, creative ability, clarity, teamwork and interactivity of the display.

A gripping plot; Fantastic CGI; An action packed adventure; a selection of great actors - well, it is directed by Stephen Spielberg. Need I say anymore?

War of the worlds was a thrill to watch, containing a nice balance of action, fear and touching family bonding. We start off in the gritty reality of modern life: a broken family, a cramped city home and a less than loving father, giving us a realistic background for our characters. The convincing acting and the plausible setting makes the concept of aliens from Mars, who have stayed hidden for millennia, plundering our planet in narcissistically formed tripod robots, a little more digestible. The film is fantastic though, so excuse my unruly skepticism!

One thing I can critique it on is the unlikely nature of Ray and the gang's near death escapes. I mean, it's a little bit like watching power rangers: the good guys always get out alive but for some reason the enemies' lasers keep missing. Now I'm not saying all the characters should've died, but perhaps if their escapes were a bit more feasible, my immersion would remain intact for the whole film.

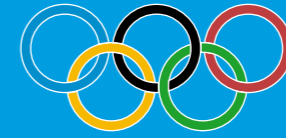
Before spoiling any more of the movie, I would like to congratulate possibly the most recognisable name in directing of our time on making this film for us to enjoy (and poke at) here at film club.

Year 8 Prayer

There have been a number of opportunities for Year 8 to participate in prayer and reflect on the role of faith in their lives. During small group sessions pupils have been given the opportunity to reflect on the link between what they study in RE lessons and their own questions. Through art, prayer and sharing, pupils have explored their own image of God, different methods of prayer and the role that faith and relationships play in their own lives. Pupils have commented that, in a small group setting, they have felt able to ask and explore answers to questions that they have such as: 'Can we believe in God and in the Big Bang?' 'What do other religions believe about God?' A particular favourite has been the opportunity to experience a guided meditation which they have found to be both restful and a helpful way of encountering Jesus.

During the term Year 8 have also prepared for, and participated in, form Masses. Each Mass has taken its theme from the readings of the day which pupils have taken as a basis for their preparations. Many pupils have written and read prayers and readings during Mass and all have contributed through reflection and preparing an altar frontal that represents each person in their form.



Year 8 Retreat

On the 31st of January and the 1st of February Year 8 pupils enjoyed a retreat day in the hall. Pupils were encouraged to get involved in a range of activities that allowed them to get to know themselves and each other better. They also had an opportunity to show off how creative they are when they produced models of Jesus using everyday household junk. Their 'Junk Model Jesus' had to have physical characteristics that represented Jesus' many qualities, for example: a big heart to show how loving he is. Role plays explaining 'Junk Model Jesus' concluded a very enjoyable and valuable day for all involved.
