Charity Fundraising hits new heights



On Friday 7th June Mrs Middleton and three representatives attended a St Joseph's Penny Lenten Appeal Celebration at Salford Cathedral. Bishop Terence Brain thanked pupils for their efforts during Lent to support St Joseph's Penny, and Caritas It was a celebration of the good work they have done in raising funds and awareness of needy families and the elderly in the Salford Diocese. It was a lovely mass and the music and singing was beautiful. It was very interesting to see all the other schools that raised money for St Joseph's Penny and celebrate as a diocesan family of schools, their wonderful achievements. The Diocese total for St Joseph's Penny fund raising for the charity Caritas is currently running at £83,000. As a school we raised £4460.73 which exceeds last year's targets. This was noted as the third highest contribution from all the schools in the Diocese and over the last two years the top fund raising from a secondary school. Well done everyone; this is an outstanding achievement!



Myddleton Grange



What a fantastic time we had with a group of Year 8 students on a residential retreat! We stayed at Myddleton Grange, the Youth Retreat House of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Leeds. Myddleton Grange is set in more than 100 acres of mixed woodland and farmland and the scenery was spectacular. Through games, activities, reflections and prayer experiences, the young people were challenged to look at their values and beliefs. It also helped to enable them to recognise and celebrate their own and each other's individuality and potential.

Year 9 Holy Cross Gifted and Talented Trip

On Thursday 20th June a group of 20 Year 9 pupils were selected to attend a session at Holy Cross College as part of the RE Department's Gifted and Talented scheme. The aim of the session was to introduce the pupils to the concepts of Philosophy and Theology. It gave the pupils an insight into some of the areas covered within the GCSE RE course and has also shown them what is available to them after St Gabriel's. The pupils found the trip interesting and enjoyable and felt that they were challenged to think about things in a different light. They said that the day was informative and gave them an insight into their own religious life and how they can study general and fundamental problems, such as those connected with reality, existence, knowledge, values, reason, mind, and language. The pupils really enjoyed the Philosophy session as they said it distinguishes from other ways of addressing problems by its critical and systematic approach. As always our pupils were excellent ambassadors of our school.

Year of Faith Writing

As part of the Year of Faith, the Religious Education department were excited to enter several pupils into a national competition organised by the Catholic Writers Guild. Pupils from Year 7, 8 and 9 were all asked to produce a creative piece of writing on the importance of reconciliation, forgiveness and starting afresh. We were really proud of the way that pupils responded to this challenge as it was not an easy competition, but pupils applied themselves to it, creating some truly inspiring work. The prizes for this national competition include £50, a Catholic Writers Guild shield to keep for a year and book prizes that will be presented at a supper with the Catholic Writers Guild. We look forward, in anticipation, to hearing about the competition winners and as a department we are impressed by the potential of many of our budding young writers.



Eco Council flies the flag for Bury

The Eco Council are proud to announce St Gabriel's as a flag ship secondary school for Bury Council. This has been testament to the hard work of pupils and staff across our school community increasing recycling initiatives and reducing energy use. Bury Council have presented St Gabriel's with a special flag to display in the foyer and highlight our commitment to Eco initiatives. This year's key success has been to improve the extent that paper is recycled from every classroom, to start recycling all food waste from Food technology, kitchen and canteen areas across the school. Each week a mountain of tea bags (from staff brews!) and other biodegradable waste is now being used to make compost and reduce Bury landfill. All this wouldn't have been possible without the hard work of our Eco Ambassadors and key members of staff like Mr Smethurst, our caretaker, and Mrs Bruffell, the catering manager, who really have gone that extra mile to try new ways of working for the environment.

In May, Year 7 and 8 pupils competed to produce an Eco poster to remind staff and pupils to turn off the lights or electrical equipment like projectors and computers which can drain our resources when not in use but left on 'standby'. With over 300 entries the competition standard was extremely high and we look forward to displaying the best pieces of work. Building Improvements for the Summer

Once again the school is embarking on a major refurbishment of the inside of the building. With money from successful bids to the Diocese, local authority and from school savings; the project will cost in the region of £300,000. Several areas will be improved including seven classrooms in the main teaching block, where ceilings and lights will be replaced, along with updated radiators, flooring and a re-paint. All the corridors in the main building will be re-floored and are having a facelift with new ceilings, doors, decor and skylights.

To enhance our already outstanding safeguarding, a larger inner lobby will be created with the intercom and automatic door restrictors moved to the internal doors near reception; this will create a suitable waiting area for parents and other visitors to the school. We are also enhancing the façade at the front of the school and introducing planters and benching where appropriate.

The fire alarm will be updated this summer to provide 'fit for purpose' protection throughout the school.

If we are successful with a planning application, we are hoping to create a new, fully customised, car park in the front area of the school, with access for vehicles further from the main gates. The front entrance gates will eventually become pedestrianised to improve pupil safety.

The governors are committed to ensuring that health and safety issues are dealt with swiftly, within budgetary restrictions, and that safeguarding is of the highest priority. Improving the learning environment of our children is also of paramount importance and we continue to move in this direction, through our development plan, as money becomes available.

Bury College Maths Challenge

The 16th April 2013 saw four of our talented Year 10 mathematicians compete in the annual Bury College Maths Challenge. They were up against twenty other High schools from Bury and Rochdale. The St. Gabriel's team, which consisted of Harry Stainton, Amy Brennan, Carl Farrelly and Ailish Sweeney, finished as runners up. This was a fantastic achievement made even more impressive by the fact they were 13th after the first round!

Well done to all the pupils for their hard work on answering some very tough questions and taking such pride in their work. All four pupils received a gift voucher as a prize.

Performing Arts Week

On 22nd - 26th April, the St. Gabriel's Performing Arts week was premiered. The objectives of the week were to combine numerous GCSE assessments as well as raising the profile of the Performing Arts Department through various public performances.

PAW Fest:

One of the more prominent public performances that took place was PAW Fest (Performing Arts Week Festival). This was a lunchtime concert which took place on the Wednesday and Thursday which showcased the talent of mostly KS4 musicians. It combined performances of School Rock Bands such as 'The Poster Girls' and 'A Call to Arms' with solo performances from Elli Kiely, Xavier Jaques, Malika Street, Beth Mellor, Hannah Kent and Ania Milejski. The festival was compared by Jack Kilroy who did a fantastic job and also managed to squeeze in his own performance of 'Fly Me to the Moon'. It was a really successful event and because of this we now hope to make it an annual event. Performing Arts Devised Performances:

In addition to this, on the 24th of April GCSE Performing Arts students shared their devised work based on the brief provided by the exam board during an evening performance. The brief was 'Is there anybody out there?' from this brief, the students created three very unique performances. For some students, this performance was 40% of their final grade. The first performance explored clowning techniques and explored a dreamlike state. The second performance of the evening, was a comedy about a group of Performing Arts students trying to find inspiration to create a performance - the Titanic scene, in which Nina Hodgson's character was confused about who was the female lead, was very memorable. The evening ended with the largest group, performing The Barman which was set in a pub called the Dusty Crow.



Drama:

In the same week, Year 11 GCSE Drama shared their final work to an audience consisting of the Year 10 Performing Arts, Year 10 Drama students and of course the visiting moderator. The drama students also devised their own work exploring the style of farcical comedy. In total, there were ten different original plays performed and assessed that week: a very busy time for the Performing Arts department! The chief moderator for Drama and Performing Arts who watched the work, stated how impressive it was that our students were able to develop and produce their own original work.

Music at the Heart of Bury Concert

The Chamber Choir took part in this high-profile event at Holy Cross College on 17th April. The choir sang 'Run' Leona Lewis, 'The Lord Bless You and Keep you' Rutter and 'Hushabye Mountain' Sherman and received lots of praise for their outstanding performance. The concert concluded with a joint item (Les Miserables Medley) with the Greater Manchester Police Symphonic Band and various other high school groups. A very enjoyable evening was had by all!

The evening show-cased a variety of musical talent featuring various ensembles in the first half followed by a stunning performance of the Bruch Violin Concerto in the second half. Year 5's experience Performing Arts.

Pupils from feeder primaries spent the day in the drama studio exploring practical Performing Arts activities. The pupils had a go at various performance techniques such as improvisation, movement and singing. The pupils collaborated to produce a short performance on the theme of 'working together' which was performed at the end of the day.

Theatre in Education performance for new intake day.

Year 10 GCSE Performing Arts students are currently devising their own Theatre in Education performance aimed at reducing the worries and anxieties Year 6 children feel in the transition to High School. The students are exploring the preconceived ideas that primary children have about high school and demonstrating, through performance, that there is nothing really to worry about. This will be performed at the end of the new intake day after the Year 6 pupils

Duke of Edinburgh Award News

To achieve an award a participant has to complete four sections; volunteering, physical, skill and expedition.

At the time of writing, thirty three Year 9 students are finalising their preparations for their assessed Bronze Award expedition in the Yorkshire Dales. As preparation for this they have completed a 10 km day walk, a two day practice at Ashworth Valley and a two day practice in the Clitheroe area. They have experienced very difficult weather conditions and carried heavy 65 litre rucksacks whilst navigating around their group's planned routes. Putting up tents and cooking on Trangias are other skills that they have mastered.

Nineteen Year 10 students have registered for the Silver Award and are planning a three day practice expedition in the Yorkshire Dales. The plan is that they will undertake their assessed expedition at the end of September.

As with all extra curricular activities it is only possible to have so many participants because we have members of staff who give up their time after school and at weekends. This year fifteen members of staff have been involved with the Award.
